Chairman's Chatter


It's customary for an outgoing chairman to reflect on the events of the past year. It's been an interesting period, if not a little challenging for us all. We've always been an active village with events occurring almost every month. All that changed in March last year. However, I feel that the way in which we have come together as a community to "Help Each Other Out" through both social media and practically with volunteers on every street and road is a change that I hope will stay with us.

Despite the challenges the Parish Council has continued to operate and meet using Zoom. Not a term I would have thought I would be using twelve months ago. The virtual meetings have worked well and, on the positive side, I think many more people have joined us than we would normally expect.

Our biggest project over the last three years has been the purchase and development of the Moss Fields Conservation Area. While this is still work in progress, the new footpath walk through the woods is proving very popular. There are now pedestrian gates leading off Smithy Lane and tree planting, a community orchard and allotments are being considered. You should be hearing more about these in the coming months.

Carrying on the walking theme, many of you have been taking the opportunity to discover the many footpaths around the village. We have an ongoing program of works to maintain and upgrade these paths. It's not an easy task and I think we all owe a vote of thanks to our lengthsmen Peter Boardman and John Nicholls for the great work they are doing.

There are always issues which are difficult for a Parish Council to resolve. One of these is speeding. At a meeting



In contrast the entrance from Hall Lane to New Street has hardly any effect on traffic speed. This is a particular high risk because of the Hurst Green Junction after the left-hand bend and the fact that the footpaths are used extensively by walkers and children going to school. We have identified these and five other possible sites for gateways and will be reviewing what, if anything we can or should change.

The second persistently, difficult issue is dog fouling. Contrary to the rumours going around, the Parish Council has not applied for a firearms licence. Instead we are commissioning a poster campaign, the details of which are in this newsletter.

And finally, there is light at the end of the tunnel. The Scarecrow Competition will be going ahead again so that should cheer us up and personally? Well, I'm looking forward to playing boules again and putting the world to rights over a relaxing pint.

The closing date for entries to be included on the voting form is the 30th June, as we need to organise the maps and get them printed in time for the weekend. If you miss the deadline for the map, you can still get involved and we'll do our best to make sure every scarecrow has its day!

Your scarecrow can be as large or as small as you like – the judges will be looking for originality and something that makes us smile, not just the technical prowess of the entry (although that is also greatly admired!)



Maps and scorecards will be available in the week before the competition. We'll ask you to rank your top 3 scarecrows and prizes will be awarded to the highest score achieved from a combination of public votes and the judge's votes.

Lily and Annie's little girls Little Girls Making a Huge Difference Challenge

Back in January after hearing so much bad news daily regarding coronavirus and cancer and also after the recent deaths of 2 close family members to cancer, Lily decided that she wanted to make a difference however she wasn't sure how she could do this as she is only 8 years old and thought little girls couldn't do anything to spark a change for the best. After discussing some of her ideas, she asked if she could set herself and her younger sister Annie, age 6, a running challenge. Together they decided that throughout February they wanted to try and run 25 miles in aid of St Catherine's and set themselves a fundraising target of £25, they called their challenge "Lily and Annie's little girls Little Girls Making a Huge Difference Challenge" and raised money using the JustGiving platform. Lily and Annie chose St Catherine's as they recently provided care and support to our family during a time when 2 family members had very short battles with cancer. St Catherine's were incredible and the support provided to our family members during their most vulnerable times was treasured. The girls wanted to give a little back in memory of these 2 incredibly special ladies.

Prior to setting themselves this challenge, the girls were not runners however once they started running they were soon covering between 2.5 and 3.5 miles daily and realised that they were going to hit their 25 mile target way before the end of February. On 12th February, the girls reached the 25 mile target, it would have been very easy for them to say that they had completed their challenge however spurred on by the support that they had received from so many family and friends and also members of the Mawdesley community they decided to set themselves a new target of reaching 40 miles before the end of the month.

By the end of February, the girls had in fact covered a huge 55.5 miles and have so far raised a whopping £2169.88 including gift aid, all of which will go to St Catherine's Hospice and will hopefully go someway to helping them support other local families at a time when they are most vulnerable and need the care of others most.

As a result of their challenge, Lily and Annie were also interviewed live by Graham Liver on BBC Radio

Lancashire as part of the BBC Make a Difference feature. The aim of the interview was to spread the word of their fundraising further and resulted in raising even more donations via the JustGiving page for this fabulous hospice.

The resilience and determination of these two little girls has been extraordinary, they went out running every day in February in rain, snow, ice, wind or sunshine and didn't once complain or want to give up. Every time they ran they received more and more support from our fabulous village community and this only spurred them on to go even further in their efforts to make a difference to the lives of others.

The challenge has resulted in Lily and Annie realising that despite only being 8 and 6 years old, they really have and can continue to make a huge difference to the lives of others. During these strange ties that we find ourselves in, the challenge that they set themselves has given the girls something to focus on and also helped to boost their own confidence and given them a sense of pride in their achievements.

Lily and Annie would like to say thank you to everyone who has donated to their challenge, the money raised will most definitely be appreciated by the staff and patients at St Catherine's Hospice.

Greetings from SS Peter & Paul's! We have been working in a very different school environment since the announcement of the Lockdown at the start of the year. School has remained open for children who come under a number of different categories and we have also had children remaining at home and engaging in their remote learning. Hopefully all children will have returned to the school classroom by the time you read this!



We have been very fortunate in being able to have remote learners and children in school following the same curriculum during the spring term. In Class 2 (Year 3 & Year 4) the children embarked on an exciting project involving writing an explanation text about the manufacturing of Cornflakes at Kellogs. Every piece of work that the children produced was sent to the Public Relations Team at Kellogs and the feedback from them was amazing! The work included interactive Power Points, colourful handwritten leaflets and very professional word documents. Darragh was the overall winner with his PowerPoint with Rose and Rafa being the runners up. All of the children who entered were lucky enough to receive a box of Cornflakes and a Cereal Bowl for their efforts.

As part of our learning in school we have been delighted for the children to be discovering the great outdoors. Recent Forest School work has involved building shelters, working with wood and setting up areas for rest and relaxation! The children have all been very intrepid and endured some challenging temperatures whilst enjoying the benefits of teamwork outdoors.







We've been focussing on keeping moving and being mindful. Children at home and in school joined in with a live YouTube session provided exclusively for us by 'Move with Ben'. The children enjoyed some fast, paced movement drills and some mindful yoga moves. Everyone finished the session with a big smile on their faces and feeling ready to the next challenge.







We are now looking forward to welcoming all the children back to school, sunshine and some super, fun curriculum learning. Wishing everyone a Happy Easter from the children, staff and families at SS Peter & Paul's.



We came back to school in September and started looking at the book entitled "Here We Are" by Oliver Jeffers. This book was about the world surrounding us and about how each person is different; has a heart and is totally unique!

Subsequently, there was plenty of coverage in the media of people being racist and what later became known as the "Black Lives Matter" agenda. In our class, we were debating this issue and exploring each person's right to freedom, to belong and to have a home. At this time, we discovered the thirty articles of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights from the United Nations.

Our teacher (Mrs H Jackson) told us that we would be completing a project during Parliament Week, in November. As a class, we decided that our project should be about supporting homeless people. We visited websites that were tending to the homeless and thought about how others could view these people. We tried to understand how hard it must be for people who find themselves without anywhere to live...

A teacher who was working in our school at that point, Miss Emily Bickerstaffe, knew of a project that was going on within Edge Hill University (EHU) that was actively seeking to support the homeless in the North West region by giving them food and clothing.

We went on to contact our constituency MP, Katherine Fletcher, and invited her into our school to meet us and discuss HM Government's response to this issue. Meanwhile, we each wrote a personal letter to a company, asking them to support our project. Some of us wrote to supermarkets, some to pharmacies, some to clothing companies and even pet food manufacturers! Our letters were very successful and we received plenty of items to distribute.





Letters and Facebook requests for used clothing, duvets and sleeping bags were also really generously supported – thank you ALL for your support. We believe that our project was very successful and we have reached out and helped people in need across our region because, after all, every human being is special and made in the image of God.

We owe a huge thank you to our teachers for their work in supporting our project and turning our ideas into action. Thanks also to the volunteers and EHU for making this happen and going out to deliver and assist people.

Whilst on a clothing theme, we have a large green clothes bank at the front of school. Good quality used clothing can be deposited by anyone and we raise funds for the PTA from each kilogramme collected. It is accessible all the time and we really appreciate all the community support: it is much appreciated!

During lockdown, we've been busy at the hall – making sure we're "Covidsecure" and using the time to carry out some improvements to the hall and its facilities. We were also pleased to offer the use of the hall to Mawdesley St Peters School in June/July.
