Chairman's Chatter

Welcome to the Spring edition of the Mawdesley Parish Council Newsletter. As I write this article it still feels very much like winter with the February rain running down the windows and a pair of soggy dogs by my side. There are, however, already signs of spring as I walk through the village. Snow drops are already in bloom and the daffodils are not far behind. Your parish council have been as busy as ever trying to encourage the flora and fauna to thrive in the village. Thanks to our lengthsman, Peter Boardman and his able assistant and fellow Councillor Mike Henty, over the winter we've planted over 400 trees and shrubs, mainly on Moss Fields but also along some of the road verges. We've also planted hundreds of bulbs and so we very much hope this planting will benefit the future generations of our beautiful village.

We listened to the village, and you overwhelmingly told us that the theme for the Moss Fields should major on nature and conservation. The community orchard is now a reality with twelve fruit trees rooted on Moss Fields. Bird boxes and a bug house have been installed and a blossom circle will soon be added. I'm very much looking forward to the spring and summer blossom as the village benefits from all the investment in planting.

There's much community entertainment to look forward to this year. The Red Lion is under the safe stewardship of a Mawdesley family, lan and Sarah Hewitt. They took over just before Christmas and already they have generated a new buzz in the old pub with many innovative events and social occasions being planned. There's a groundswell of support to restarting the very popular Mawdesley Tea Party co-ordinated by

David Reynolds and the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations that Janine Clayton has kindly agreed to co-ordinate. With the creativity and community spirit in the village I'm sure these extremely important social initiatives will help us not only recover from Covid but grow from strength to strength.

Every year the Parish Council invite community groups to apply for funding for capital projects. This year we approved the donation of $\mathfrak{L}600$ to the Cricket Club for a new field gate, $\mathfrak{L}2,500$ to the Millennium Green for new recycling bins, $\mathfrak{L}2,500$ to the Village Hall for modern stage lighting and $\mathfrak{L}400$ to Mawdesley Scouts for new equipment storage facilities — all of which help to enhance Mawdesley as a village community.

Finally, I'd like to encourage everyone to get involved in supporting the village. There are many ways to do so, and it doesn't have to mean significant time or money. We very much welcome the community's ideas and opinions and so if you would like to get involved at any level please contact any of the parish councillors (contact details are at the back of this newsletter) or look out for our facebook page and newly re-established website (https://mawdesleypc.uk). You can also get involved by standing for election to the Parish Council. There will be elections this May and we encourage anyone with a passion for volunteering to support the village in this way to have a go.

I look forward to seeing many of you around our village supporting the many fun community events throughout the year.

Mawdesley Walking Day & Tea Party 2022



The Mawdesley with Bispham Tea Party Committee are delighted to announce the return of Walking Day and the Tea Party celebrations for 2022, which we think is fantastic news after the event could not take part for the last two years, and particularly in this year of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

For those of you who are new to the village, Walking Day falls on the second Saturday in July and commences with a short service at St. Peter's Church before a procession makes its way from the church down to The Eagle & Child, accompanied by a brass band, morris dancers and brightly decorated floats. After a short refreshment break, the procession returns back to Mawdesley, making its way along High Street, New Street and Hall Lane (perhaps with another refreshment break at the Red Lion!) before turning at Stocks Hall and then back to Rectory Field for lashings of high tea in the marquee and an evening party to talk about for many months thereafter!

The Tea Party nearly folded 30 years ago but the willingness of a group of young people

back then thought otherwise and re-established it and others have allied themselves to its continuance ever since. It is now time for a new generation to help keep the tradition alive. The Tea Party is the envy of many villages in our area, combining in a traditional way, both a walk of witness and celebration of our community and is one of the finest of the events of the summer in Mawdesley (and there is a great deal of competition!)

An important update from Parish Councillor Grahame Green regarding road safety

The Highway Code has changed. The 29th of January updates affect driver priority, pedestrian and cyclist rights of way, mobile phone use behind the wheel and broader use of fines for poor or dangerous driving.

Rule H1: New hierarchy of road users

Drivers of vehicles that can cause the greatest harm in the event of a collision bear the greatest responsibility to take care and reduce the danger to others. This principle applies most strongly to drivers of HGVs, LGVs, cars/taxis and motorcycles. Cyclists and horse riders likewise have a responsibility to reduce danger to pedestrians.

Rule H2: New priority for pedestrians at junctions

At a junction, drivers, motorcyclists, horse riders and cyclists should give way to pedestrians crossing or waiting to cross a road into which or from which you are turning. You should give way to pedestrians waiting to cross a zebra crossing (currently you only have to give way if they're already on the crossing), and to pedestrians and cyclists waiting to cross a parallel crossing.

Rule H3: New priority for cyclists when cars are turning

You should not cut across cyclists, horse riders or horse drawn vehicles going ahead when you are turning into or out of a junction or changing direction or lane. This applies whether they are using a cycle lane, a cycle track, or riding ahead on the road and you should give way to them. Do not turn at a junction if to do so would cause the cyclist, horse rider or horse drawn vehicle going straight ahead to stop or swerve. You should stop and wait for a safe gap in the flow of cyclists if necessary.

Other key amendments include clearer guidance for drivers to leave a distance of at least 1.5 metres when overtaking cyclists.

Drivers are also encouraged to reduce the risk of an accident by opening their door by using the hand on the opposite side, as it is more likely to lead to them looking over their shoulder.

For more detailed rules The Highway Code: 8 changes you need to know from 29 January 2022 - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)

Hitting a pedestrian at 40 mph there is a 90 percent chance they will be killed.

At 35 mph there is a 50 percent chance they will be killed.

At 30 mph there is a 20 percent chance they will be killed.

At 20 mph there is a 2.5 percent chance they will be killed.

Between the two 20mph signs on New Street it is approximately 0.5 mile

Driving at 20 mph will take 1 minute 30 seconds.

Driving at 30 mph will take 1 minute.

Surely a person's life is worth half a minute of someone's time?


