Chairman's Chatter

I've just read the Chairman's Chatter we published in January. As a village we were very active over the previous months and had a lot to look forward to in the coming year. Then on March 21st the world stood still. The clear blue skies were free of vapour trails and the traffic disappeared from New Street – completely. Suddenly the village was quiet. The phrases "selfisolating" and "social distancing" entered our vocabulary and if we didn't know what two meters looked like, we do now.

Like most people I wondered how we would survive the restrictions with few of the resources of the major towns and cities. I needn't have worried. Within days an army of volunteers emerged to support our vulnerable people.

The Parish Council would like to thank all our residents for their support in keeping Mawdesley and the community safe in these exceptional times. A group of volunteers worked together to form "Mawdesley's help each other out" to provide support for the elderly and vulnerable. The response to the request for help was fantastic. We quickly reached the position where we now have volunteers looking out for residents in every street in the village. The volunteers have shopped, run errands, made PPE and more importantly been there to listen and talk to the isolated and lonely.

I would like to pay a special tribute to the management and staff at Spar who have been heroic in keeping the store stocked and ensuring those that were house bound received their orders. It's hard to imagine how difficult life would have been without their efforts. Coronavirus looks likely to affect us all. However, we have the wonderful privilege of living in a caring village community and between us we can make sure that no one is left unsupported.

Life is gradually returning to some level of normality. The Parish Council had its first ever virtual meeting this month on Zoom with a few members of the public looking in. If you fancy logging into one and don't mind your councillors being tonsorially challenged, the next virtual meeting will be on July 8th at 19:30. Look out for the links on the noticeboard and on Facebook.

You may have noticed an increase in Openreach activity throughout the village. This forms part of an extensive project to improve broadband in the region and will involve the erection of new telephone poles. This is a permitted development and, whilst we have made our feelings felt, there is nothing the Parish Council can do to prevent the pole installations. As an aside, some residents were worried that this work was being carried out to bring 5G into the village. At a 'socially distant' meeting with the Openreach Area Manager we were assured that the work is only to install fibre optic cables and was definitely not 5G.

As for the future? Well, as far as we are aware the events referred to in January's newsletter are on hold until such time as government restrictions are lifted or relaxed. It's a pity really, I think the Open Gardens event this year would have been spectacular with all the gardening everyone's been doing.

It's a community effort... ...Mawdesley villagers unite against coronavirus isolation

The Parish Council would like to thank our residents for their support and assistance in keeping the special parish of Mawdesley and the community safe in these exceptional times.

The huge impact of coronavirus and cl

COVID-19 had a huge impact on Rainbow Hub – the local charity which supports children and young people with physical and neurological disabilities.

Not only did the centre in Salt Pit Lane have to close its doors due to the extreme vulnerability of the children who use its services, but it has also had to cancel many of the events that bring in the vital funds needed as the charity does not receive any statutory funding and has to raise all of the money needed to continue and develop their services so every penny counts.

For those who don't know them, Rainbow Hub is an amazing charity and is a lifeline for the children and parents they support. Its aim is to ensure that each child achieves his or her individual potential – in most cases, these are things most of us take for granted like walking, speaking, playing and feeding themselves.

But, although the charity had to close its building they did not give up on the children. They set up online videos, one to one virtual sessions and advice for parents so that the children can maintain some of the therapies at home that make such a difference to their lives by keeping movement going using conductive education therapy.

And they have now started a new communication group where one of the team members will read stories, teach sign language and encourage participation using a variety of different methods. Rainbow Hub believe that this is the first group of its kind to be used to assist the children with their communication skills.

Fund-raising is also a major issue. Normally, at this time of year, Rainbow Hub would have been organising hundreds of people who would have been rambling 5 or 11 miles around the Lancashire countryside but they had no option but to cancel the event in the current situation. But they didn't give up and decided to try a Virtual Ramble asking people to stay safe but to make a donation and use their daily exercise or

activity at home to take part and over 400 supporters took up the challenge and raised a significant amount of money for them. It was also a perfect opportunity to celebrate the achievements of the children and many of them set their own personal challenges. Finley Crosby (2) from Chorley and his family did a 5 mile walk and Finley's dad James who is a gardener, offered to do a garden free for the person who matched his donation of £100.

These Superhero challenges represent huge efforts on the part of the children and can be seen on Rainbow Hub's Facebook page. Lyndsay Fahey, Head of Fundraising at Rainbow Hub, said "we are amazed and delighted with the support we have received – it is a fantastic result and it was brilliant to see the community coming together to support a local charity. We are extremely grateful to everyone who took part or donated."

She continued, "but we have also had to cancel our very popular Ladies Day and Cross Bay Walk and have to find other ways to raise funds so we are looking at how we can use more virtual events to raise more funds. In the meantime time we would like to thank all of the organisations and individuals who are supporting us."


Many thanks from Lisa Rutter


We could start postings and photos the week before and that would build up excitement for the Day. I've got some great old and recent ones, really clear, which I will start to post.

We've all been affected by the events of the last few months but people keep saying "When will things return to normal?" "Who knows what the future holds?" – What we do know is that there is a future and we all want it to be something that we are all part of.

Though the village hall has been closed since March, we will re-open and we hope that as many people from Mawdesley and surrounding area will be part of our future.

We have tried to use the lockdown period to our best advantage – the upgrade of the toilets (asked for by many in our consultation exercise) had been planned for August – we have brought this forward and it should be completed by early July – the latest non-touch technology has been added to make the facilities fit-for –purpose for the future.

We are currently looking at how we can offer the local community what people need – the bar has recently been upgraded and we are considering further refurbishment, so that we can offer the people of Mawdesley a venue for getting together again.

Here at Clear Care we have been busier than usual during the last few months. For many of our customers we have taken on extra responsibilities for their health and overall wellbeing as families have been unable to visit or provide their usual support.

As an important part of our care is providing companionship and each person has their own small group of carers we have built up good trusting relationships with our clients and their families, so everyone has been happy for us to take on a wider role.

The most frequent question we have been asked is not 'will I get the virus' but 'when can I get my hair done'? Many of our customers usually have weekly visits from their hairdresser and this helps to lift their spirits. We have therefore taken on hairdressing duties with wash and sets becoming a speciality and there have even been a few haircuts.

Our customers have also missed going out, as usually we accompany people on shopping trips, pub lunches, garden visits and afternoon teas. Even though we have explained that many venues are closed, one couple took themselves off to the local hostelry for a pub lunch and could not understand why it was locked and no one was there! A key focus of our care has been on making sure that people have a positive frame of mind and supporting their general feeling of wellbeing. We have been encouraging people to stay mobile and active. Where they are unable to walk far for fresh air and a change of scenery, we have been taking people out on socially distanced wheelchair walks. On the basis that a little of what you fancy does you good one client has a weekly home cooked chip butty night as she was missing her Friday night fish and chips from the local chippy. One client who is 99 years young has been busy crocheting blankets for premature babies and completing one of her prize-winning embroideries.

As people have been unable to attend hospital appointments these have been replaced by telephone consultations. Many clients are hard of hearing, so we have been there to support the calls. In advance of one such consultation I asked the client who is 96 'are you in pain, they will want to know'? His response was 'I can't remember'! I said, 'I think we can safely tell them you are not in any pain as I am certain you would remember if you were'.

As many people have recently come to realise, the care profession has long been undervalued by a lot of people. Over the past few months, we have been central to keeping a lot of people in our local community safe, healthy, happy and most important of all living in their own homes.
